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I. STUDY BACKGROUND

A. PURPOSE OF SURVEY

The 2017 Child Care Market Rate Survey was conducted for the Division of Child Development and Early Education (DCDEE), North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) by the Center for Urban Affairs and Community Services (CUACS) at North Carolina State University. The purpose of the survey is to establish recommendations for market rates for subsidized child care through the North Carolina Subsidized Child Care Program. The study is based on a survey of child care providers across the State and represents the sixth such survey. This report describes the procedures used in the survey (Section I), provides background on current operation of child care facilities (Sections II through V), and presents the findings of an analysis designed to recommend changes to the current market rate (Section VI).

B. REQUIREMENTS FOR SUBSIDIZED CHILD CARE

Many of the child care facilities across North Carolina use public funds to assist in paying for the care for some or all of the children that are enrolled in their programs. The NC General Assembly appropriates funding for the NC Subsidized Child Care Program and has designated NCDHHS to supervise this voucher-based program. As federal funds are also used to operate the NC Subsidized Child Care Program, certain federal requirements must be met by program administrators and participants. Included among these is the regular completion of a survey to determine the fees charged for child care services in the various markets throughout the state. This information is used to determine how subsidized child care reimbursement rates compare to private pay rates and helps establish the subsidized reimbursement rate.

A “market rate” or “subsidy rate,” as referenced in North Carolina legislation, represents the maximum amount that a child care center or home may be paid with subsidy funding for child care services. Child care providers are currently reimbursed at the market rate or their private pay rate, whichever rate is lower. Market rates are established for each county; age groups (infants/toddlers, two-year-olds, three- to five-year-olds, and school-age children); types of child care providers (centers versus homes); and rated license levels (one- through five-star licenses). For purposes of establishing market rates, the age groups for centers are as described above; however, for homes, infants and one-year-olds are considered separately for reimbursement.

Market rates are not *average* child care rates. Market rates are established using the 75th percentile by child, which means that if surveys find that there were 100 children whose parents paid for child care in a certain county, the market rate would use the 75th percentile rate, counting from lowest to highest paid for an individual child in that county. Market rates have been set using the 75th percentile so that eligible children could have access to a majority of child care options. Further adjustments to the 75th percentile have been made in this study in order to ensure ascending market rates for higher star ratings. If there are not at least fifty children in an age group/type of facility/rated license level combination for a county, an imputed rate is used in the development of the market rates for that county.

1. Federal Requirements

Federal and state requirements impact how North Carolina conducts its market rate survey and how information gathered through the survey is used to establish payment rates for subsidized child care. Federal requirements are established in regulations for the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF), the federal block grant for child care, and the instructions to states for developing federally mandated block grant plans (State Plans). The United States Department of Health and Human Services reviews Child Care and Development Fund plans and reports to monitor states' compliance with federal requirements. When the 2017 Market Rate Survey was conducted, the federal requirements in effect included these provisions:

- According to the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF), each state must conduct child care market rate surveys to ensure that payment rates for subsidized child care reflect the child care market.
- Federal child care regulations require states to ensure that “payment rates are adequate based on a local market rate survey conducted no earlier than two years prior to the effective date of the currently approved Plan.”³
- Each state must provide “a summary of the facts relied on by the State to determine that such rates are sufficient to ensure equal access” to comparable child care services provided to children whose parents are not eligible to receive child care assistance. Federal regulations governing the use of CCDF subsidy dollars suggest a benchmark: “Payments established at least at the 75th percentile of the market would be regarded as providing equal access.”
- The Federal Fiscal Year 2017-18 CCDF State Plan requires states to describe how rates are sufficient to ensure equal access to child care services.

2. State Requirements

Payment rates for the Child Care Subsidy Program are specified in the North Carolina General Statutes and in State Budget Special Provision legislation detailing how funds made available to state agencies should be used. Special Provision language in State Fiscal Year 2014–15 resulted in adjustments to market rates effective January 1, 2015, and additional increases were provided October 1, 2017 and 2018 based on partial implementation of the recommended market rates from the 2015 *Child Care Market Rate Survey*.

C. TERMINOLOGY AND DEFINITIONS

Because North Carolina's Market Rate Survey process goals are driven by carefully worded federal and state requirements, key terms and definitions are provided below. Terms that can have different meanings are also clarified to indicate how they are used in the context of this study.

Current Market Rates - This term describes the maximum subsidy payment rates that were in place in May 2018.

Child Care Center - A child care center is an arrangement in which six or more preschool children are cared for in a residential setting or three or more preschool-age children are cared for in a building other than a residence.

Family Child Care Home – A family child care home is a child care arrangement, located in a residence, where up to five children aged infant to five-years-old, or up to eight children if three or more are school-age, receive child care. This includes preschoolers living in the home but does not include the provider’s own school-age children.

Modeled Rate – The “modeled rate” is the rate assigned to a particular type of care (center or home) by age group (infants through school-age) and star rating (1 through five stars). It is the greater of the county 75th percentile rate, or the imputed rate, developed based on the number of children in a particular category of care. Rates can be imputed by age, type of care (center versus home), or county.

75th percentile - The term “75th percentile” is used to describe the subsidy payment level that enables a parent to afford 75 percent of the privately purchased care of a certain type in an area. To determine the 75th percentile, the private pay rates for all children served within a category of care are ranked by child from lowest to highest. Counting from the bottom (lowest rate), rates are counted three-quarters of the way up to identify the rate that represents the 75th percentile.

Private Pay - This term refers to rates or fees paid by a parent or guardian to a provider for child care services that are *not* subsidized.

Raw County Rate – A “raw county rate” is the rate that represents the 75th percentile for a given county, regardless of the number of children in that type of care in that county. For example, if there is only one two-year-old child in a four-star facility in a county, the raw county rate would be the amount charged for that child’s care.

Preschool Children – In the Market Rate Survey, “preschool children” are those zero to five years old including infants, toddlers, and young children through the age of five, but excluding five-year-olds already in kindergarten.

School-Age Children - In the Market Rate Survey, “school-age children” are children five through twelve years old, excluding five-year-olds who have not yet begun kindergarten. School-age child care is typically offered before and after school, and during school breaks (including summer breaks), during track-out periods for year-round schools, or for teacher workdays and holidays.

II. STUDY METHODOLOGY

A. SURVEY POPULATION

All regulated child care centers and family child care homes were included in the survey population except, Head Start centers, Developmental Day centers, and providers that offer only part-time care for children (ages 0 to 5 for less than 32 hours a week in September 2017). Head Start programs were excluded from the survey because their financing is different from those of other child care facilities. Certified Developmental Day Center rates were also excluded because their rates are captured through a different process. Centers and homes that served only children receiving subsidy services in September 2017 (no care for children of private-paying parents) were included in the survey, with the stated private-pay rates charged by the facilities used in the calculation of updated market rates.

B. SURVEY DESIGN

The study involved the use of a single survey form for child care centers and family child care homes. As in the previous surveys, the 2017 survey was designed to capture information on child care enrollment and rates for the month of September 2017 and for summer care for school-age children during July 2017.

A pretest of the survey and instructions was conducted with a random sample of forty child care programs statewide. Providers were encouraged to participate based upon the assurance that information collected via the pretest survey would be used for the official survey, with limited follow-up for any additional information needed. Based on respondent input during the pretest, minor changes were made to the final survey form and instructions.

C. DATA COLLECTION AND DATA QUALITY CONTROL PROCEDURES

Three methods were offered for completing the market rate survey: mail, online, or by telephone. A Market Rate Survey packet was mailed to 6,168 child care centers and family child care homes in North Carolina in October 2017. The survey packet included a letter from the Director of DCDEE (see *Appendix A*) asking child care providers to complete an online survey at a secure site hosted by CUACS. The secure website allowed respondents to download a PDF of the survey (*Appendix B*) if they preferred to complete the survey on paper and return by mail. The survey package also included instructions, a prepaid business reply envelope, and a postcard that could be returned if respondents believed they were ineligible to participate in the survey.

Three weeks after the initial survey packet was mailed, trained interviewers made telephone calls to non-responding child care providers in an attempt to complete the survey. These telephone calls were conducted over a period of nineteen weeks. Using an established protocol, telephone interviewers reminded survey non-respondents of the importance of the survey and assured confidentiality of their information. Providers who chose not to complete the survey via internet

or telephone were reminded of the option of using mail or fax to return the survey form. Based on outcomes of the telephone calls, survey packets were mailed or faxed to respondents who had not completed the survey online, who had lost or discarded the survey packet, or who reported not receiving a survey packet.

D. FINAL SAMPLE

1. Sample Disposition and Response Rate

Contacts were attempted with a total of 6,168 facilities including 4,359 Child Care Centers and 1,809 Child Care Homes. Table 1 provides information on the sample disposition (see *Appendix C* for sample disposition by county).

Table 2 contains information on the final response rate for the “adjusted sample.” The adjusted sample *excludes* the categories denoted by an asterisk in Table 1, including: respondents who could not be located, those who represented duplicate records, those with no children enrolled at the time of the survey, those who do not charge fees, and those whose programs include only NC Pre-K. The remaining pool is considered to represent respondents who are truly eligible to participate in the survey.

A total of 5,319 eligible respondents were contacted and asked to participate in the survey; 4,582 of those completed the survey by phone, paper, or online, representing a response rate of 86.1 percent. The response rate for child care centers was higher than for child care homes at 88.6 and 80.6 percent, respectively.

2. Sample Characteristics

Tables 3 through 5 present descriptive information on the characteristics of the final survey sample. Of the 4,582 facilities who completed the survey 3,910 met the eligibility requirements for inclusion in the analysis. Among the 3,910 facilities participating in the survey, slightly over a quarter enroll children only through private payment and slightly under three-quarters also accept subsidized payments (Table 3). The comparable figures for receipt of subsidies are higher for child care centers, at 82.6 percent, than for child care homes, at 56.6 percent. Among the total sample, around 37 percent of private-pay only facilities are ranked as four- or five-star compared with two-thirds of those who also accept subsidies. Patterns are similar for centers and homes, with the higher star ratings among those who accept subsidies.

Table 4 presents information on the number of children enrolled in participating facilities by funding type and star rating. A total of 161,245 children are represented among the facilities participating in the survey.¹ Among these children, around two-thirds (n=101,149) are in facilities that accept only private payment funding and slightly over a third (n=55,648) are in facilities that accept both forms of payment. Among children in private-pay only facilities, about 62 percent are in facilities with a star rating of 4 or 5, compared with about three-quarters in facilities that also accept subsidies.

Table 5 presents information on enrolled children by type of facility, type of payment accepted, and age group. Among centers, school-age children represent slightly over a fifth of children enrolled in private-pay only facilities compared with slightly over a third in centers that accept subsidized payment. The pattern for homes is similar, but school-age children represent 39 percent of those in homes that accepts subsidies.

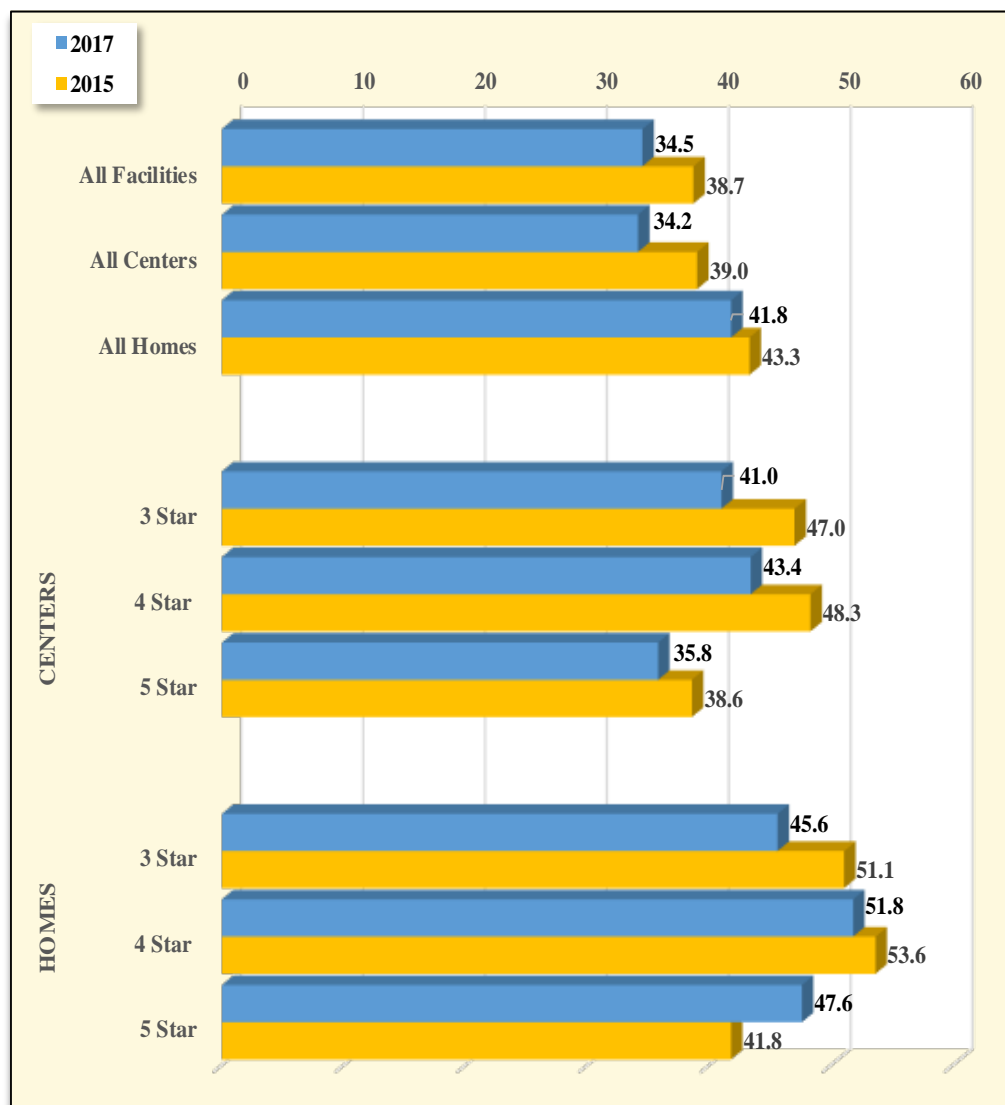

III. CURRENT PRIVATE PAY VERSUS SUBSIDY RATES IN NORTH CAROLINA

About 35 percent of children enrolled in participating child care facilities at the time of the survey were receiving subsidies (Figure 1). This number is down slightly from 38.7 in 2015 and percentages for both centers and homes were slightly lower in 2017. Among centers, the percent of children receiving subsidies dropped slightly for facilities at all star levels. Among homes, the percent receiving subsidies dropped slightly for three and four star rated facilities but increased slightly for five-star facilities.

Figure 2. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017: Infants and Toddlers in Centers

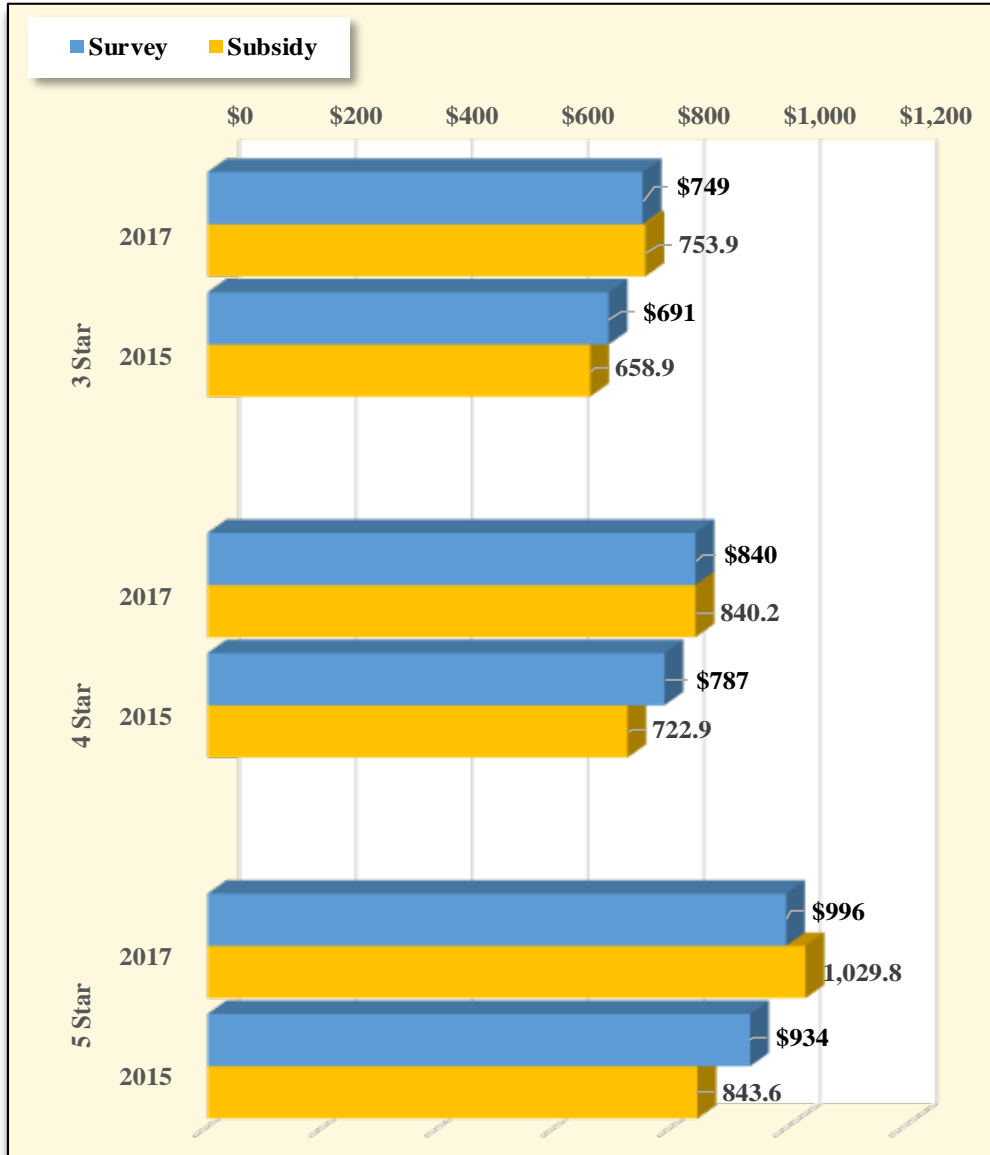


Figure 3. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for Two-Year-Olds: Centers

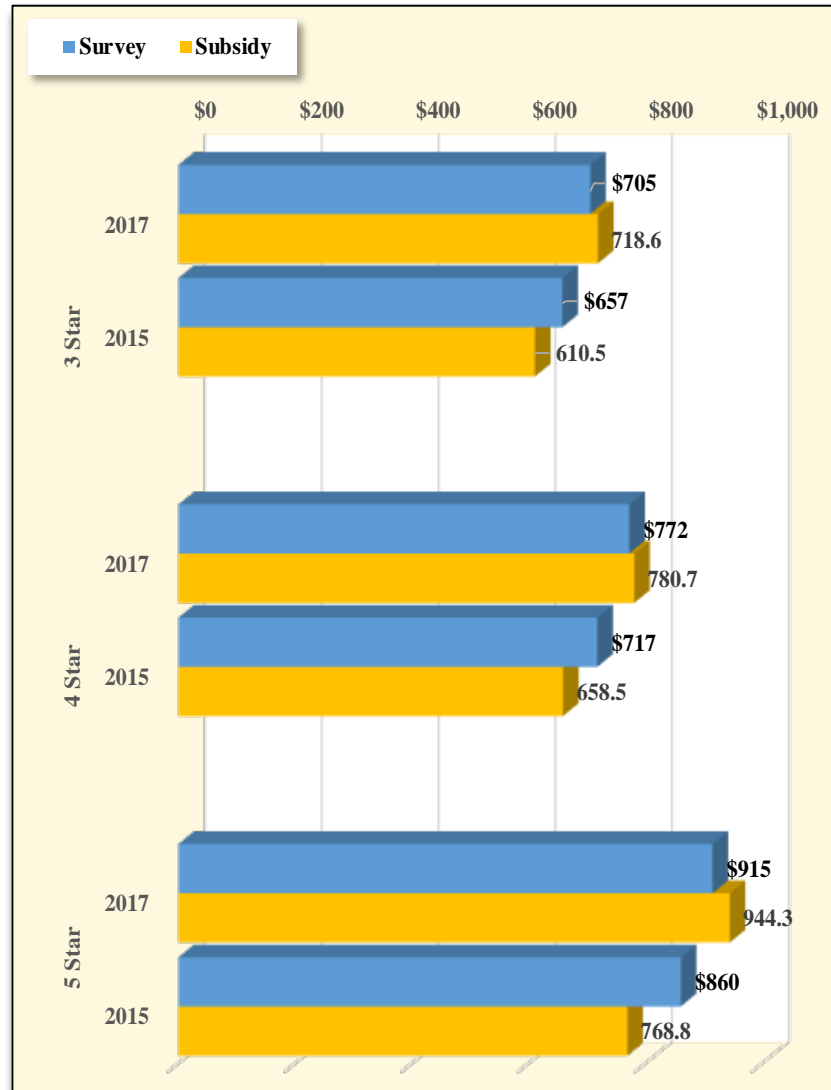


Figure 4. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for Three- to Five-Year-Olds: Centers

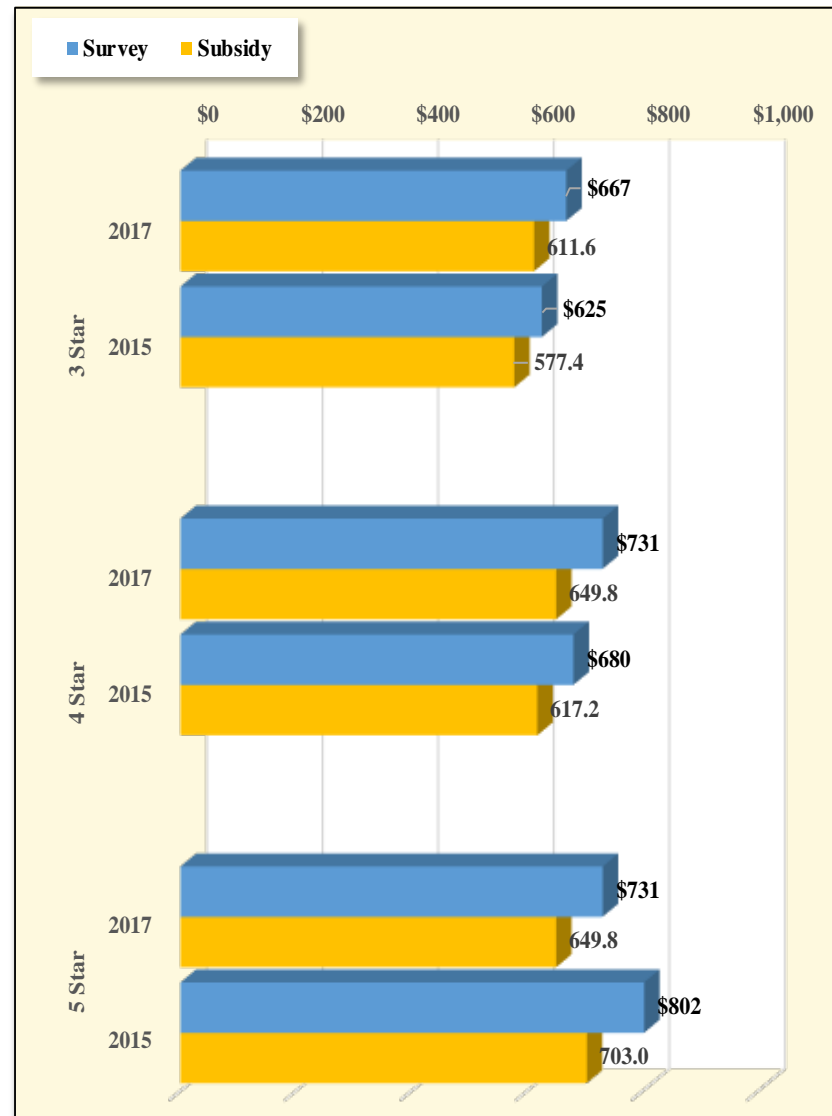


Figure 5. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for School-Age Children: Centers

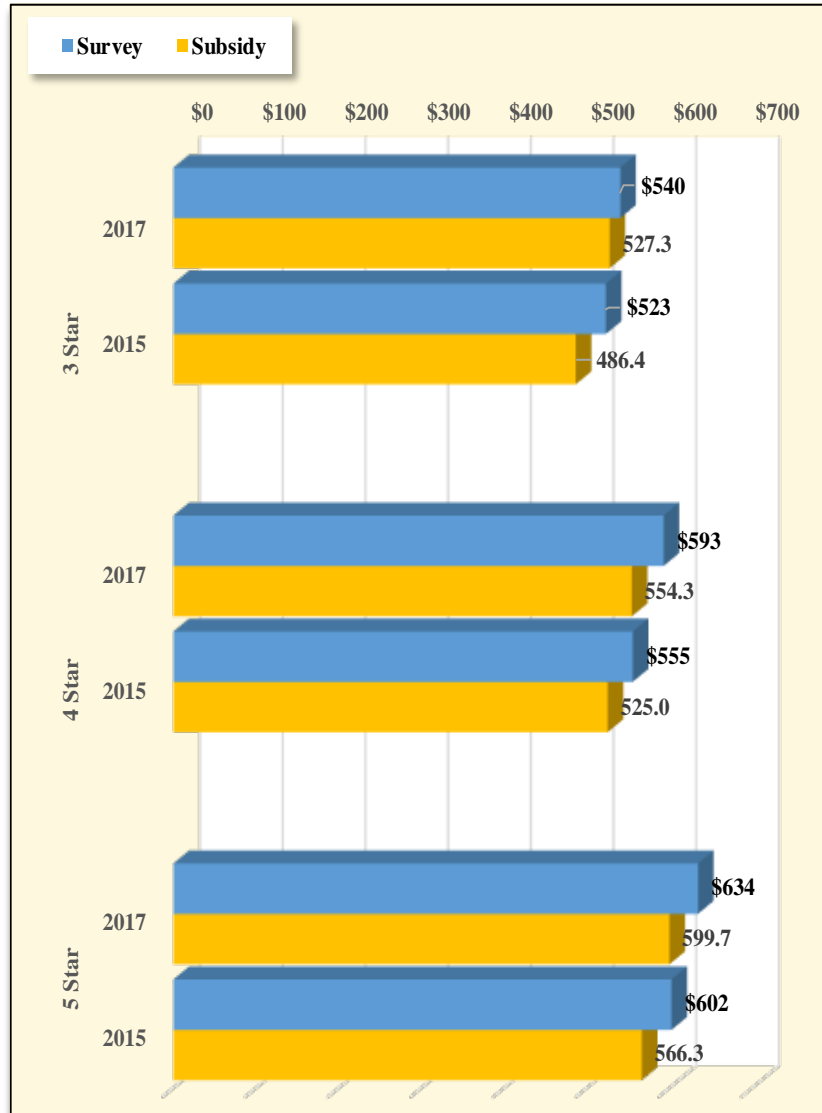


Figure 6. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for Infants: Homes

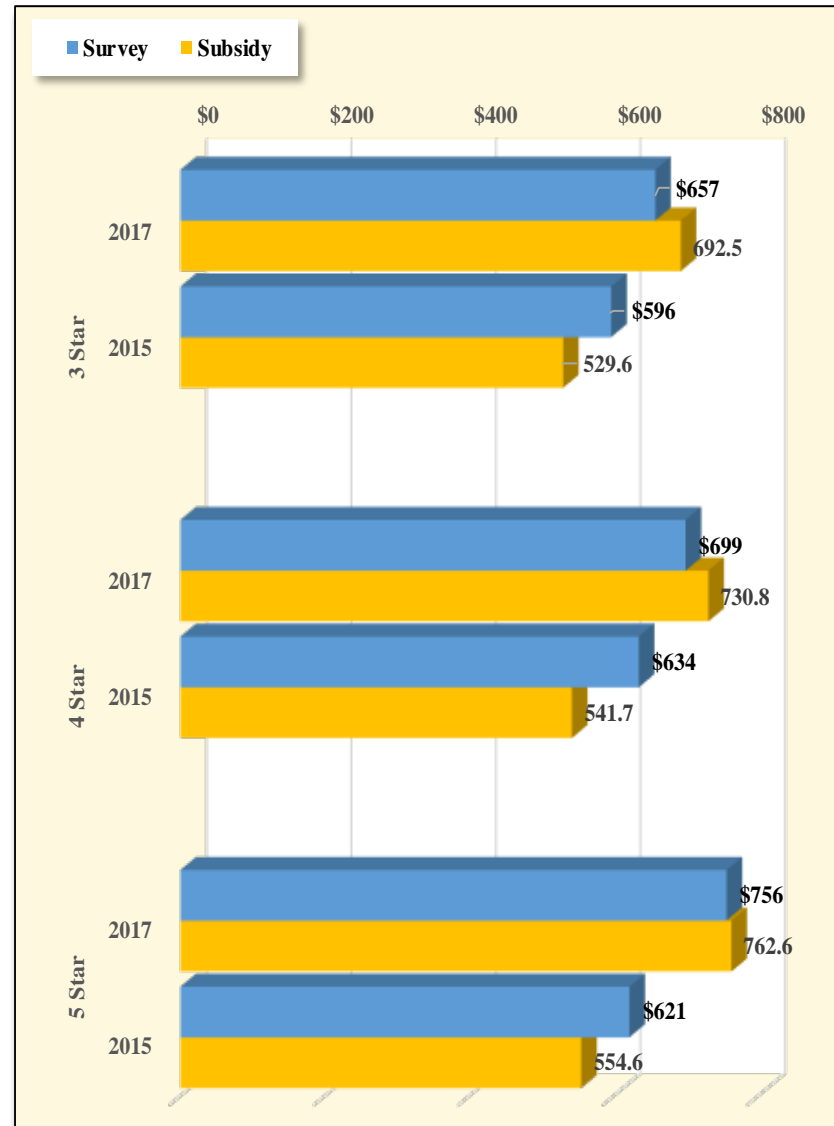
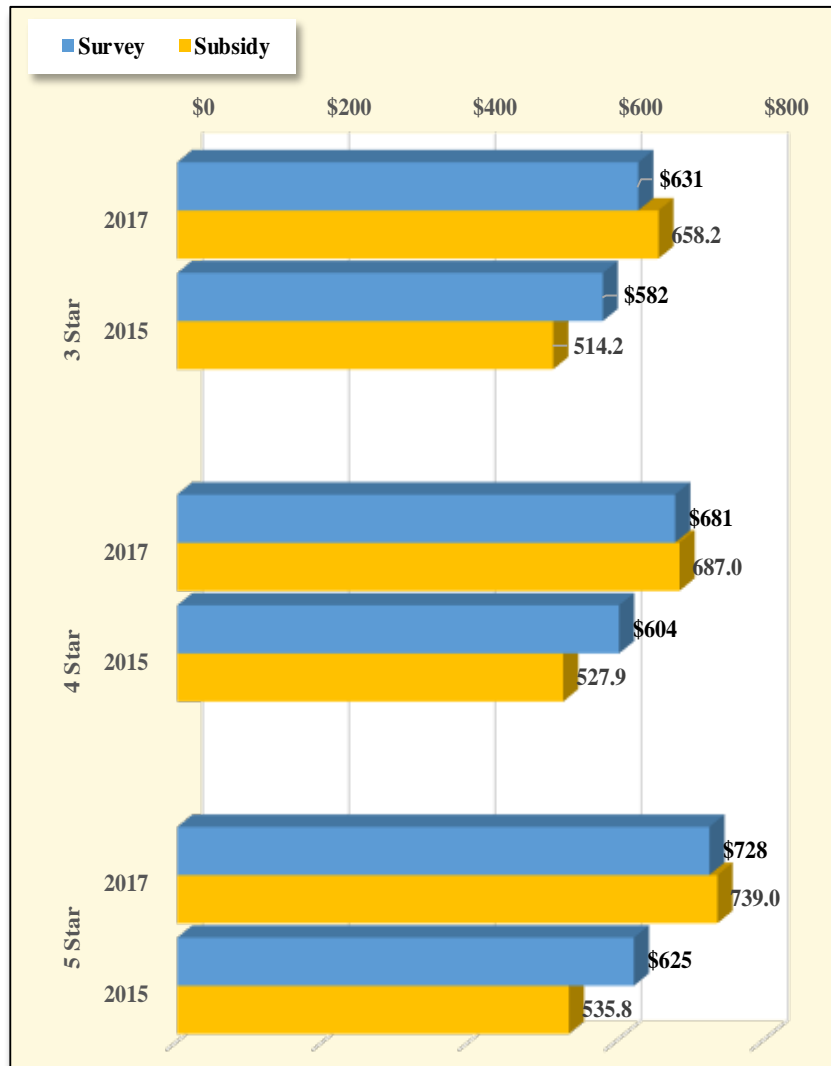


Figure 7. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for One-Year-Olds: Homes

Figure 9. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for Three- to Five-Year-Olds: Homes

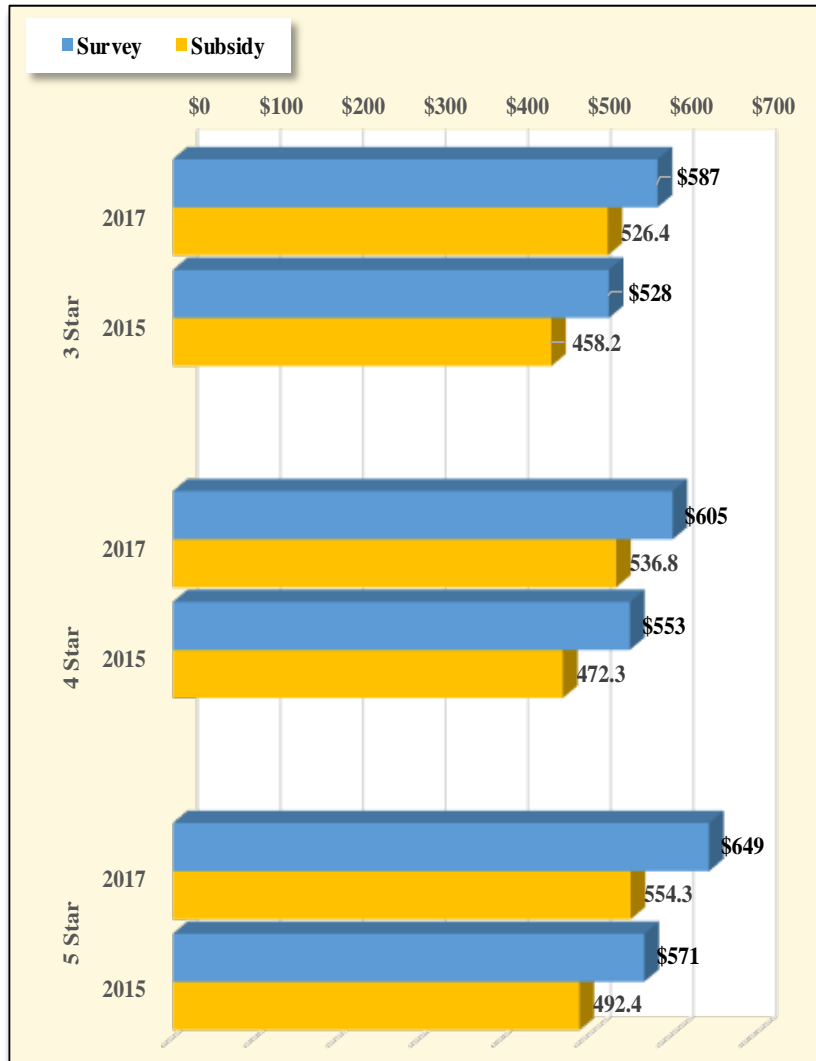
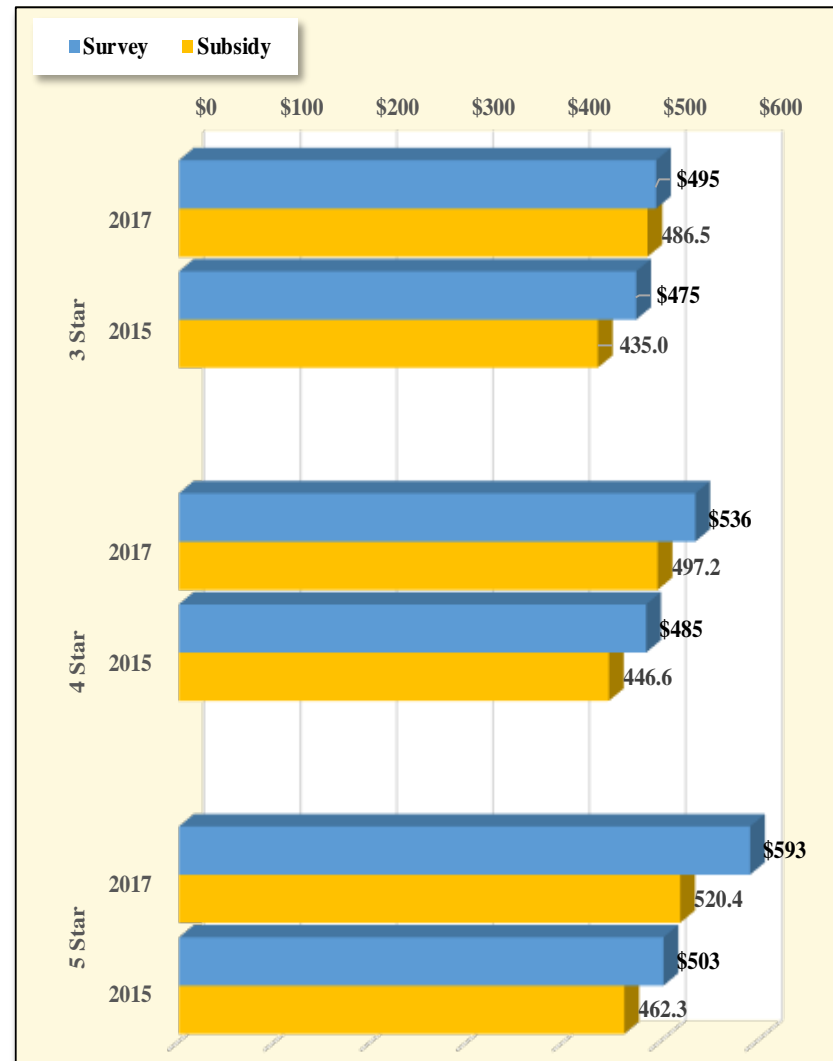


Figure 10. Survey Versus Subsidy Rates for 2015-2017 for School-Age Children: Homes



IV. CHILD CARE PROGRAM OPERATION

As in previous surveys, the 2017-18 survey included questions regarding factors that impact day-to-day facility operation and rates. Providers were asked to identify the method(s) they used to set private-pay rates, if their facility received monetary or non-monetary contributions, and if the current economy affects their ability to provide services.

A. BASIS FOR SETTING PRIVATE PAY RATES

Facilities generally use more than one source of information to set their child care rates. Table 6 presents information compiled for responses, on the various factors used in setting rates. Among 3,910 facilities responding to the question concerning bases for rate setting, the most commonly cited factor was the current child care subsidy rate. A total of 2,020 facilities, or 51.7 percent of respondents, cited this factor. Among the 2,020 respondents who cited child care subsidy rates, over two-thirds of those represented three- and four-star facilities (N=539 and 722, respectively).

The rate charged by neighboring facilities was viewed as equally important, as cited by 51.4 percent of the total sample. Despite common trends, centers and homes differ on their rate setting factors. Homes are slightly more likely than centers to use what they believe parents can afford as a basis for setting rates. Likewise, the input of corporate offices, church boards, or a school's Board of Directors was cited by 37 percent of centers but by only 3 percent of homes.

Table 7 displays factors used when setting rates and also shows the number and percent of children who are enrolled in facilities. Among 161,245 children represented in the facilities responding to the survey, the greatest number 98,286 (61 percent) of those are enrolled in facilities that use neighboring facilities' rates as a guideline for setting rates. Child care subsidy reimbursement rates and the actual cost of child are also important determinants in rate setting, representing 47 and 46 percent of all children, respectively. Corporate offices, church boards, or school's board of directors impacted about 44 percent of children as well.

B. CONTRIBUTIONS TO ASSIST WITH PROGRAM OPERATION

Table 8 shows contributions to assist with child care facility operations. Among the total sample (n=3,910), the most common contribution was food, with 61.7 percent (2,415 facilities) receiving Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) support. Facilities with star levels of 4 or 5 comprised about two-thirds of all facilities citing this contribution. Approximately 70 percent of homes received CACFP reimbursements. The percentage of centers receiving free or donated food was somewhat lower, with 58 percent reporting CACFP reimbursements. No other contributions were comparable in prevalence in comparison to CACFP reimbursements. Grants were cited by 9.9 percent of facilities, and materials and supplies by 9.4 percent.

Table 9 shows the number of children served by facilities that received various types of donations in 2017. A total of 169,754 children were served by facilities receiving contributions to assist with operation of their programs as compared to 126,497 children served in 2015. Over 163,000 children were enrolled in these centers in 2017 compared to 119,054 in 2015. The number of children served by family child care homes who received contributions to assist with program operation declined from 7,443 in 2015 to 6,685 in 2017. Grants and free or donated materials and supplies represented the second most common contribution for 2017. The number of children in facilities citing receipt of grants increased dramatically over time, with 21,826 children in 2017 compared to 1,856 in 2015.

C. IMPACT OF ECONOMIC CONDITIONS ON PROVISION OF QUALITY CHILD CARE

1. Impact on Facilities

Child care facility respondents were asked if current economic conditions contributed to an increase, decrease, or no change in their ability to provide particular services within the last twelve months. Findings indicate what areas current economic condition impact providers' child care services (Table 10). Almost half of facilities increased their food budget and a third saw an increase in salary expenditures. Around 39 percent of facilities experienced an increase in the cost of equipment, materials, and services.

Among centers (Table 11), 47 percent experienced an increase in their food budget and 47 percent increased staff salaries. Thirty-eight percent of centers increased their budget for equipment, materials, and services and 18.3 percent decreased staff work hours. Patterns among child care homes were similar to those of centers. Over half of homes increased their food budget and about 40 percent increased their purchases of equipment, materials, and services.

2. Impact on Children

Table 12 shows the number of children enrolled in facilities that were potentially affected by various economic conditions. Almost half of children were enrolled in facilities that saw an increase in their food budget and over half were enrolled in facilities that saw an increase in staff salaries. Around 42 percent of children were enrolled in facilities that increased their purchase of equipment, materials, and services.

A higher percentage of homes than centers saw increases in food budgets (56.8 compared to 48.3 percent of centers), but far more centers saw an increase in staff salaries (55.9 percent compared to 4.9 percent of homes). (See Table 13). A greater proportion of centers compared to homes also increased their budgets for all other areas, except daily hours of operation, staff training, and number of children per classroom.

D. FACILITIES CHARGING THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN SUBSIDY AND PRIVATE RATES

Table 14 provides information on facilities that charge subsidy recipients the difference between their subsidy rates and private-pay rates (Yes response to the question, “Do you charge parents receiving subsidized child care any of the difference between your private pay rate and the subsidy reimbursement rate?”). Over a quarter (n=593) of centers and 19 percent of homes charge the difference. Table 15 presents information on the number of children who received subsidies and are enrolled in facilities that charge the difference in private-pay and subsidized rates. Across age groups, the greatest percentage of children impacted by such charges are enrolled in four- or five-star centers. Patterns are similar for subsidized children homes, with the greatest percent in four or five star facilities.

E. COLLECTING CO-PAYMENTS FOR SUBSIDIZED CHILD CARE

Child care providers are responsible for collecting co-payments from families that participate in the Child Care Subsidy Program. All providers participating in the Child Care Subsidy Program were asked if they were able to collect the entire amount of parent co-payments each month. Of all the facilities that participated in the Child Care Subsidy Program, a total of 2,277 facilities reported that they were able to collect the entire amount of parent co-payments each month (Table 16). About three-quarters of centers participating in the subsidy program and 88 percent of homes reported being able to collect the entire amount of parent co-payments each month.

The remaining providers that participated in the Child Care Subsidy Program, but were unable to collect the entire amount of parent co-payments each month were asked what percentage of parent co-payments they were able to collect during the month of September 2017. On average, centers collected 71 percent of these co-payments during September 2017 and family child care homes reported collecting an average of about 54 percent of parent co-payments during this same time period.

F. REASONS FOR NOT PARTICIPATING IN THE NC SUBSIDIZED CHILD CARE PROGRAM

In previous surveys, facilities were asked if they chose not to participate in the NC Subsidized Child Care Program because the subsidy rate was lower than their private-pay rates. In the 2017 survey, facilities were asked for specific reasons they did not participate in the subsidy program.

In Table 17, over half of the centers and homes surveyed indicated that they do not serve families who qualify for the program (see *Appendix F* for results by county). A fifth of centers and a quarter of homes indicated that their facility does not have a three, four, or five star-rated license.

Among centers, three- to five-year-olds comprised the largest percentage of all children enrolled in facilities that opted out of the subsidy program, and one-star facilities accounted for the largest number of children enrolled in centers opting out of the subsidy program (Table 18). Three- to five year olds also constituted the largest percentage of children enrolled in homes that opted out of the NC Subsidized Child Care Program, but more children were enrolled in four-star homes than homes of any other star-level that had opted out.

In 2016, the General Assembly approved legislation to increase subsidy rates for three-, four-, and five-star rated centers and homes who participate the Subsidized Child Care Program in counties classified as Tier 1 and Tier 2 (the 80 most economically distressed counties¹). These increases were designated for facilities who served infants through five-year-olds not in school. The 2017 Child Care Market Rate Survey included a section asking qualifying facilities if their subsidy payment increased; if so, for what age groups; how they were using the additional funds; and, if applicable, why they did not increase in their rates. Of the 3,910 facilities surveyed, 1,766 facilities were located in Tier 1 or Tier 2 counties with a star rated license of three, four, or five. Overall, these centers comprised 47.1 percent (N=1,227) of the total number of centers surveyed; the qualifying homes comprised 41.4 percent (N=539) of all homes surveyed.

Respondents representing these facilities were asked if they had received an increase in their subsidy reimbursement rates since 2016. Among the total group, 42.9 percent indicated they had received an increase in their subsidy reimbursement rates and 44.3 percent indicated they had not (Table 19). Another 12.8 percent indicated that the question was not applicable as they did not qualify for subsidy reimbursement rate increases or were unaware of the change in the subsidy rate at the time of the market rate study.

Among centers, a total of 532 indicated that they benefited from the subsidy increase (Table 20). Of this group, 28.4 percent represent three-star ratings, 40.9 percent represent four-star ratings, and 30.7 percent, five-star ratings. Among homes, the largest percentage was among four-star rated homes, with the percent representing five-star ratings notably lower, at 16.8 percent.

Respondents whose facilities could receive an increase in subsidy rates were also asked to indicate the age groups for which the subsidy payments increased. Over 64.0 percent of all facilities received subsidy rate increases for infants to four years old and about 50.0 percent received subsidy rates increases for five-year-olds not in school (Table 20). Over 60 percent of homes reported an increase in payments for infants, one-year-olds, two-year-olds, and three-year-olds, while fewer reported an increase in four-year-olds, and five-year-olds not in school (58.4 percent and 43.8 percent, respectively).

Respondents from facilities that received subsidy payment increases were asked how they were using the additional revenue. As shown in Table 21, both centers and homes cited purchase of equipment and materials (57.0 percent of centers, 65.9 percent of homes) and using the money toward rent, utilities, and/or maintenance (46.4 percent of centers, 55.3 percent of homes) as the top two uses of additional money. Over 43.0 percent of centers used the funds for staff salaries and 34.6 percent used the funds for reducing existing debt. Homes used the funds to purchase equipment and materials (66 percent); for rent and utilities and/or maintenance (55 percent); and to pay off existing debt (39 percent).

Among facilities that did not receive an increase in subsidy rates, 49.2 percent overall indicated that the payment rate did not change for the age groups they served: 49.9 percent of centers, 48.1 percent of homes (Table 22). Thirty-three percent of centers and 23.3 percent of homes indicated they did not receive an increase because their private-pay rates were still lower than the new subsidy payments. 13.7 percent of centers and 24.3 percent of homes indicated they were not aware of available increases in subsidy payments.

VI. DETERMINING CHILD CARE MARKET RATES

A. MARKET RATES AND THE FEDERALLY MANDATED SURVEY

This section documents procedures and findings of the analysis designed to model market rates for the 2017 survey cycle. The market rate analysis presented here takes into account the previously discussed North Carolina Star Rated License System (referred to as star rating), which is designed to encourage and reward increased child care quality, measured by facilities' achievements in program standards and staff education. Facilities apply for, are evaluated on the basis of, and are awarded by DCDEE star rated licenses for operation. The star ratings range from a one-star rated license ensuring the provider is meeting a minimum standard of care, up through a five-star rated license indicative of providers who have met higher standards for quality. The market rate analysis is based on the assumption that there is a direct relationship between market rates and star rating: that is, market rates will increase as star rating increases.

B. DETERMINING MARKET RATES

1. Raw Market Rates

For the 2017 analysis and in previous surveys, the number of children in an age group at a given star-rating level in each county is calculated as the sum of the number of private-paying children and the number of children receiving a subsidy. Children receiving subsidies in a facility are counted at the facility's private-pay rate, because that is the rate charged by the facility for care. Each county's "raw market rate" is determined by rank-ordering the private-pay rates for all the children reported, from lowest to highest, for each combination of age group and star rating. At some point in such a rank ordering, 25 percent of children will be higher up the scale and 75 percent will be lower on the scale; this point is known statistically as the "75th percentile." This figure represents the "raw market rate" for each combination of age group and star rating for that county.

Legislative mandate requires that rates be set using the reported rates of at least 50 children. The process of dividing the rates in each county into provider type, age group, and star rating often results in too few children at a particular combination of care to allow this minimum 50 child requirement to be met. Also, the 75th percentile rates do not always rise naturally across star levels as desired. The 2017 analyses relied on a strategy from 2015 and earlier to determine modeled rates and to correct for the inherent surges and dips in each county's rates across star levels. This method constructs preliminary market rates by using the actual 75th percentiles found within each combination of type (center or family), age group, and star rating in each county when the number of children is large enough (at least 50). When there are not enough children in a particular combination of type, age group, and star rating in a county, the preliminary rate is imputed based on data from a wider group of children, called the **imputation level**.

For example:

- If there were 50 or more children in an age group, information from that age group is used to impute preliminary rates for the star levels with less than 50 children.

- If there were fewer than 50 children in the age group within a county, but 50 or more children in a type (center or family) in a county, all of the children in that county in that type were used to impute the preliminary rates for that star level.
- Finally, if there were not 50 or more children in a type within a county, all the children in the county were included to impute preliminary rates for the star levels with less than 50 children.

For imputation levels of age group and type, the difference between the county's raw 75th percentile (from the survey) for each combination of type, age group, and star level, and the corresponding state's 75th percentile is determined for all categories at the imputation level. Then the mean difference is calculated, weighting each difference by the number of children in the category. The mean difference is then added to the state rate for the categories that need an imputed value. For the imputation level of county (combining centers and homes), the mean percent difference is used instead of the mean difference. Tables 23 through 25 show examples of three imputation methods.

2. Age-Imputed Rates

An **age-imputed rate** was determined when there were not fifty children at a particular star rating in an age group, but there were at least fifty children across all star levels for that age group. In the first example, the weighted mean difference was \$276 (Table 23). The greater of the county's 75th percentile rate and the age imputed rate becomes the modeled rate. This methodology assures that counties were held harmless by never receiving a model rate less than the county's 75th percentile rate. The final step is to determine an adjusted rate (*final adjusted rate*) by performing a weighted linear regression for each age group in each county to obtain a strictly increasing rate as the star rating increases.

3. Type Imputed Rates

As shown in Table 24, when there were not 50 children in an age group across star levels, but there were at least 50 children in all age groups combined for a specific type of care (center versus home), a **type imputed rate** was generated. The same imputation method that was used for age imputed rates was performed. Following the same procedure as with age imputed rates, the larger of the type imputed rate or the county 75th percentile rate becomes the model rate, thus holding the county rate harmless. After the model rate was determined, the final adjusted rate was developed using the same weighted linear regression that was used with age-adjusted rates.

4. Countywide Imputed Rates

Table 25 shows how data is used to develop rates when there were not at least 50 children in a type of care within a county. Since there were less than 50 children in all family child care homes within the county, all children within the county (centers and family child care homes) were used to impute rates. These rates are referred to as *countywide imputed rates*. The imputation method changes for developing countywide imputed rates due to the fact that all children in the county are utilized. The imputation in this case was performed by subtracting the *weighted mean percent difference* of the county's 75th percentile rate from the state's 75th percentile rate, and then applying that difference to the state's 75th percentile rate at each star level. After the countywide rates were imputed, the same procedures for determining the model rates and the final adjusted rates were implemented. With the exception of one county in the 2017 analysis, countywide imputed rates were used to develop rates only for family child care homes.

C. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN STAR RATING AND MARKET RATES

During the 2017 study, there were twelve counties in which 50 children were not served in centers and family homes combined:

The county-imputed rates for these counties were used and the imputations were based on all the children in the state and substituting state rates produced rates very different from the rates reported in that county. The preliminary rate was always set as the maximum of the actual 75th percentile rate (if one existed) and the imputed rate. In extreme cases of missing data, further imputations were used to best approximate changes in rates.

1. Regression Analysis to Create Modeled Rates

After the preliminary rates were set, a regression analysis was performed for each county in order to ensure an increase in rates with an increase in star levels, and the new rates were set as the rates determined by the regression. The regression model is based on the assumption that rates would always be directly (or positively) associated with increased star level, but that was not always the case. Tables 26 and 27 list counties where negative relationships were found in centers and homes,

respectively. The negative relationships may be due to unusually high rates at one-, two-, or three-star facilities or unusually low rates at the four- and five-star facilities, or any combination of the above. For those counties and age groups, state level data were substituted for individual level county data. The procedures used in the multiple regression analysis are detailed below:

1. The county “slopes” (numbers representing the strength of the relationship between star rating and cost) were obtained by regressing the star ratings against the 75th percentile rates for each age group in each county.
2. The regression models were weighted by the number of children at each star level. If there were no children at a star level, the weight was set as 1, in order to include the imputed value in the regression.
3. Even though all imputations were based on more children than the individual category, the imputed rates were determined using the number of children at each star level. It therefore made sense to weight a star rating with many children more than a star rating with few children when performing the regression. Plotting the data would show the star ratings on the X-axis, and the 75th percentile rates on the Y-axis.
4. Three different regressions were performed for each of these graphs: a linear regression (based on star rating), and two nonlinear regressions, one based on the square of the star rating, and one based on the cube of the star rating.
5. The curve with the closest fit to the data is used as the county’s slope for each combination of provider type and age group. A curved line (a best-fit for squared or cubed star rating) means that for that age group, the market pays a higher premium for moving from one-star rating to a higher star rating as the star ratings increase; the premium for moving from four- to five-star ratings will be larger than the premium for moving from three- to four-star ratings. The fitted points are then set as the market rates.
6. For counties and age-groups with inverse relationships between star level and rates, an additional step was taken. Three new regression analyses were performed statewide for each type and age group, and as with the county regressions, the closest fit was set as the slope. The mean differences or percent differences for the county’s rate (from the corresponding state rates) were then applied to the state slopes to set a new revised market rate.

2. Determining Accessibility of Child Care Based on Modeled Rate

An analysis was performed to investigate the accessibility of child care based on the amount of care that can be purchased with existing market rates and the proposed market rate adjustments described above (the modeled rates). In this analysis, accessibility was expressed as the percent of children who attended child care centers and homes where the market rate (or modeled rate) would fully pay for the costs.

The results for 2017 are compared with 2015 results in Table 28. (*Appendix D* presents current, surveyed, and modeled rates by county.) The methodology targeted the 75th percentile. For all child care facilities, the modeled rate would have paid for 72.8 percent of the children, 72.6 percent of the children in centers, and 75.5 percent of the children in homes. In contrast, the current market rate would have paid for 36.2 percent of all the children in child care facilities, 36.0 percent of the children in centers, and 39.8 percent of the children in homes. These figures are similar to the 2015 data with several exceptions. The subsidy rate paid for homes increased from 30.6 percent to 36.2 percent of children from 2015 to 2017. Subsidy rates for centers increase from 30.8 to 36.0 percent and subsidy rates for homes increased more than 10 percent, from 27.3 to 39.8 percent. Variation in modeled rates between the two survey cycles was less dramatic ranging from about 1 to 2 percentage points difference across facility types.

Table 29 contains information on accessibility of child care by age group and star level of the center in which the child is enrolled. For centers, the greatest discrepancy between current subsidy rates and modeled rates is for one-star centers, regardless of age group. In these centers, the difference in modeled versus subsidy rates ranges from around 59 percent to 65 percent.

Generally, as star rating increases, the discrepancy between subsidy and modeled rates decreases (Table 30). For school age children, the difference in the two types of rate shows less variation than for the other four age groups. Rates for infants in three through five star facilities and one-year-olds in five-star facilities show lower discrepancies (all below 20 percent) than other age groups and star levels.

VII. CONCLUSIONS

Among survey respondents, the reported number of children receiving child care services in 2017 has declined since 2015, 167,256 to 161,245, representing a decrease of 3.6 percent. The number of children receiving subsidy being served by centers decreased from 156,835 in 2015 to 153,604 in 2017, a 2.0 percent decrease. For homes, the number of children receiving subsidy served decreased from 10,421 in 2015 to 7,641 in 2017, a drop of 26.7 percent.

The reduction in the number of children served could be attributed to the fact that there were fewer facilities providing child care in 2017 (6,168) as compared to 2015 (6,678). This represents a difference of 548 fewer homes, though the state added 38 new centers from 2015. Not only were fewer children reported to be served compared to 2015, but the percentage of children reported overall as subsidized declined from 38.3 to 34.5 percent.

The goal of the market rate assignment process is to recommend subsidy payment rates for providers that are fair, equitable, and based upon actual fee data gathered throughout the state from the Market Rate Survey. DCDEE works to ensure that providers, who achieve higher levels of quality, as reflected by higher star ratings, are paid a higher rate of reimbursement. DCDEE also strives to ensure adequate child care is accessible to as many children as possible throughout the state. The 2017 modeled rates produced by the analyses of data gathered through the 2017 Market Rate Survey meet all the intended goals and objectives.

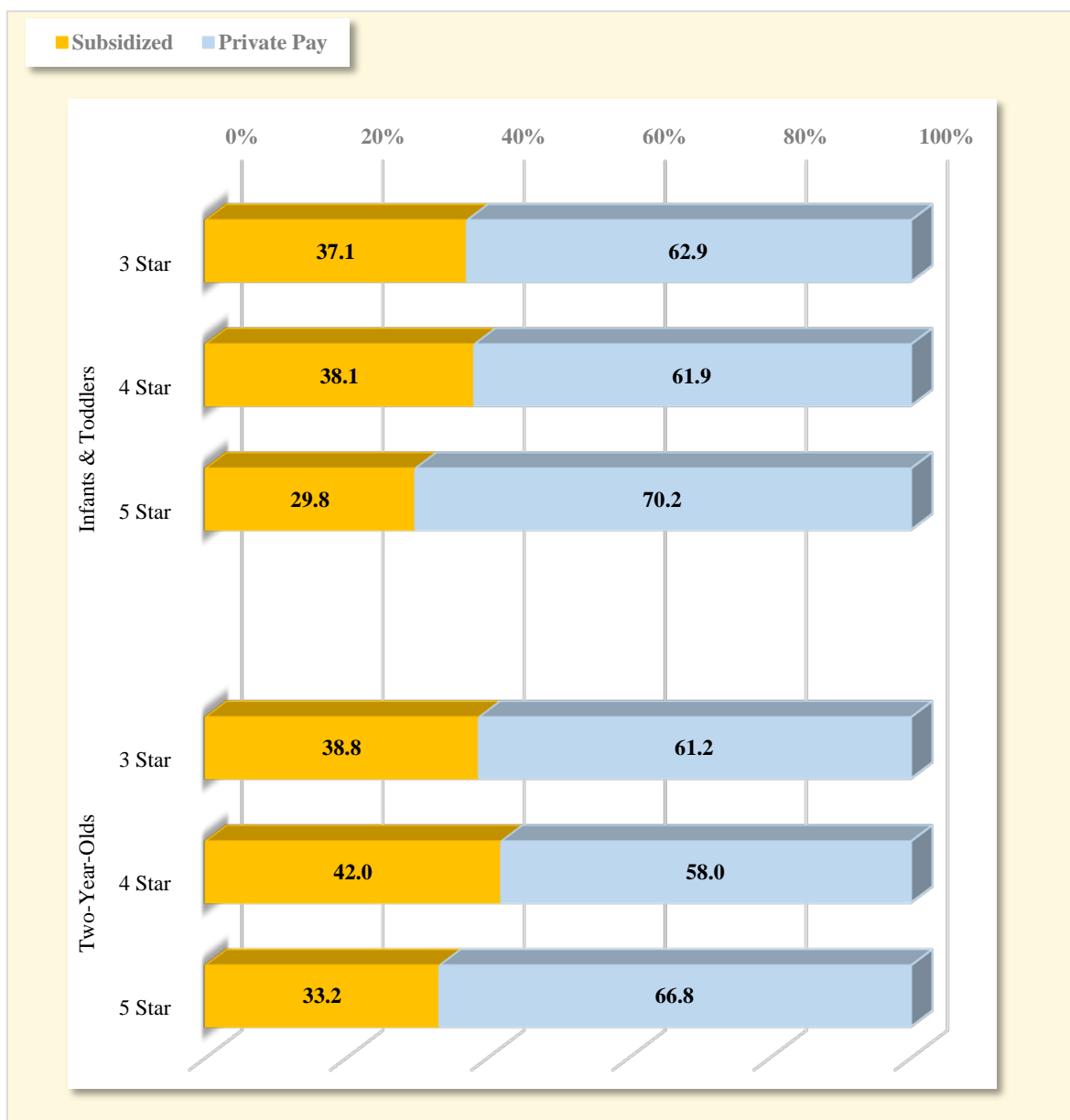

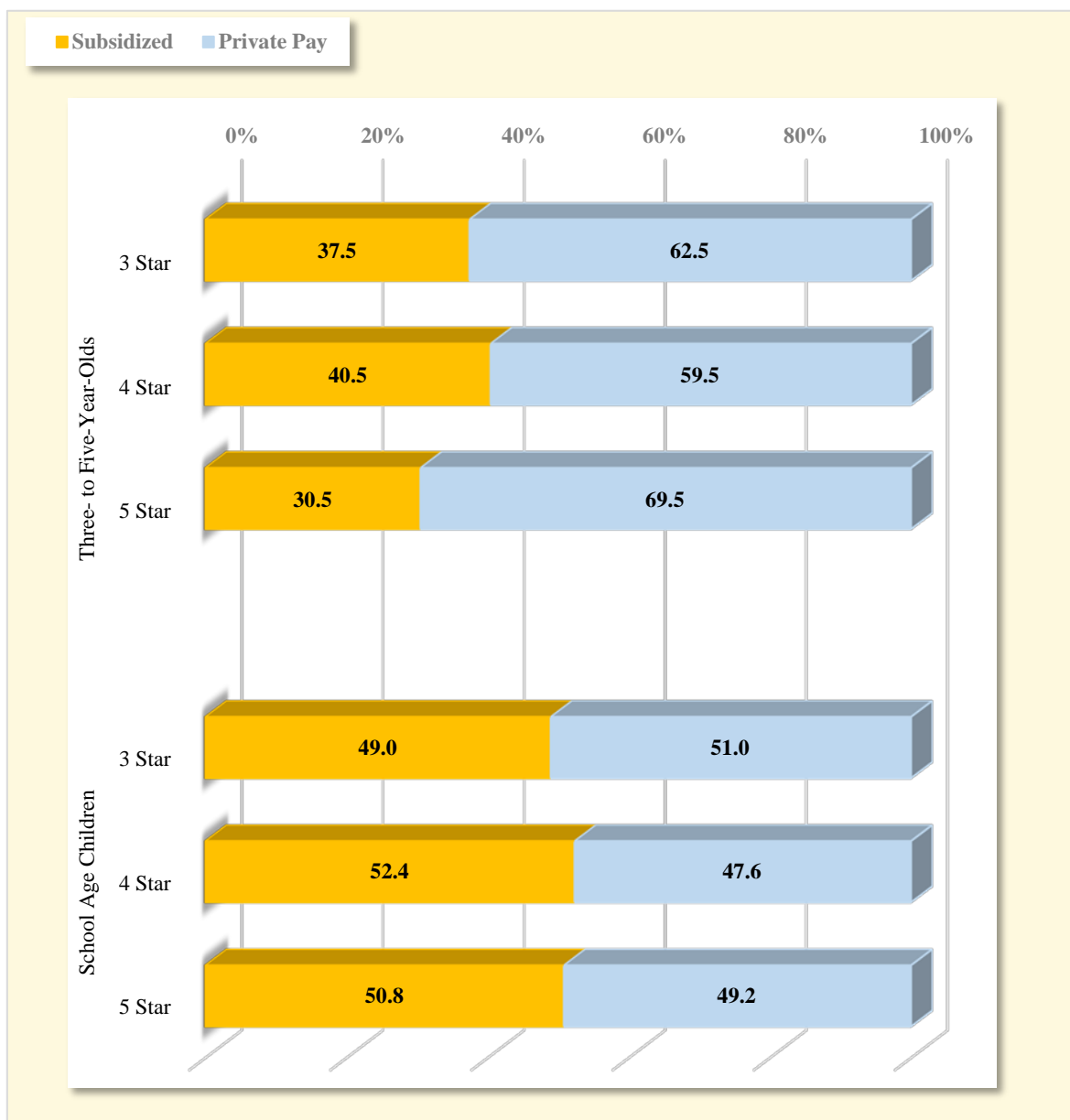

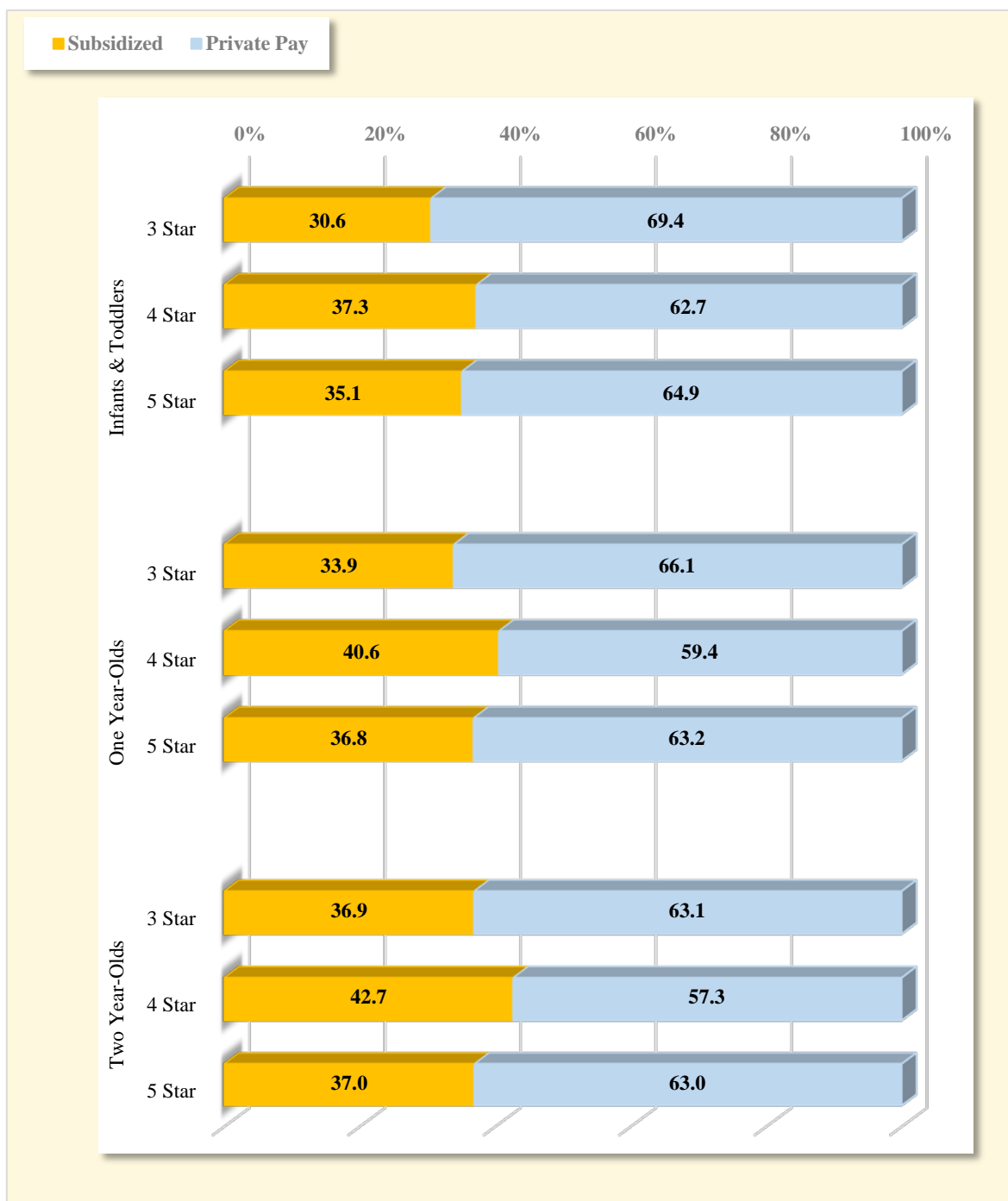
PERCENT SUBSIDIZED BY TYPE FACILITY AND STAR RATING

Table G-2. Percent of Three- to Five-Year-Olds and School Age Children Subsidized by Type Facility and Star Rating: Centers.



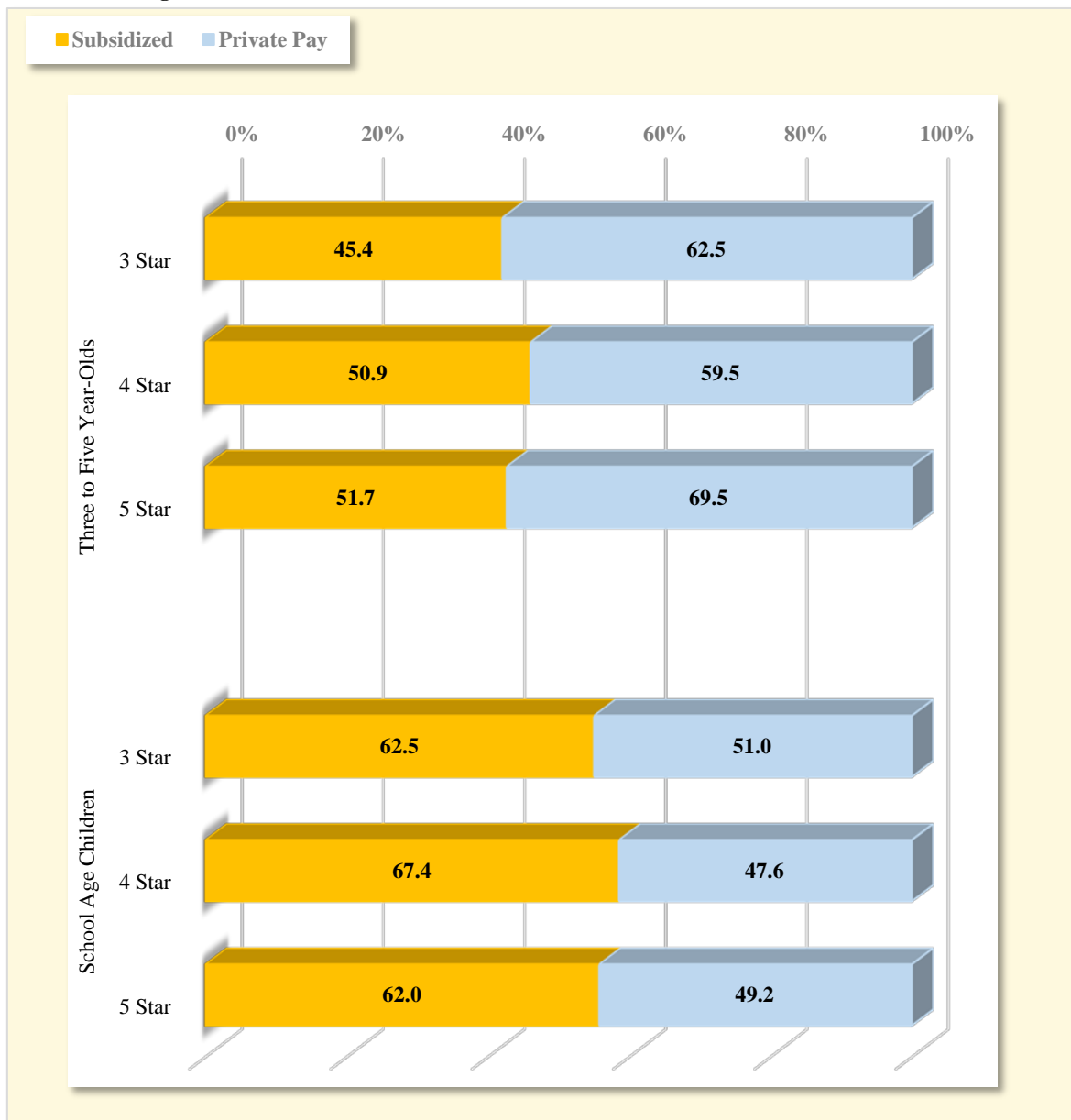
